As SAIA President I cannot hold office at the Regions as this might be a conflict of interest, so I officially handed over the Presidents role to our Vice President Donette Werkman last week. She is an incredible leader and I know that with the support of Dries Verbeek and Jeremie Malan she will have the support she needs until she takes up full office as PIA President in September.

Acting as SAIA Vice President the last year has at times taken me away from active involvement of PIA, the SAIA Executive team have stepped in and supported me the entire way. To say SAIA has challenges is an understatement. That said there are incredibly passionate people on the SAIA Board who are willing and ready to do the hard work to right this ship. The truth is that most of the people I meet want SAIA to succeed in some form or another, there is more consensus than I originally thought. The last 2 months I have been facilitating a Task Team looking at SAIA structurally to find solutions. The Task Team presented its report to the Board the last week of June and voted on the motions prepared by the various focus groups. All SAIA members will be given the opportunity to give comment on these motions in the next few weeks. I encourage everyone to engage in this process and inform the way forward for SAIA.

There has been great concern with the exit of CIfA from SAIA that was formally announced last week. All the Regions, even PIA, are under financial strain. Our membership is decreasing, and we are losing relevance. CIfA as the biggest Region of SAIA has been no different. The CIfA members have been unhappy with SAIA for some time now and have voted to step away. However, in discussions with the CIfA Committee it was clear that they are willing to keep talking to SAIA and find a way to possibly rejoin in future. All SAIA members deserve to get tangible benefit from the investment they make through their individual and practice fees.

During my time at PIA, I have seen our committee grow. I have tried in my term to put the systems in place for all these volunteers to have a voice and contribute. We now have a By-law that can be adjusted as the PIA evolves. I encourage the new Committee to review this document Bi-annually with each incoming President. However, there is still work that needs to be done in order that PIA is running optimally. We need to grow our membership, more members paying less. The cost of membership is still a barrier to be overcome. A monthly payment system needs to be investigated. We also need to look at a third income stream for PIA, lack of sponsorship since covid has impacted all the Regions so PIA is not alone. I believe that there should be more resources assigned to this task. Another aspect that still needs work is support for the sub-committees. When you're relying on only volunteers to initiate and action programmes it will take longer and might fall off the agenda simply due to limited available time. Having a secretary for subcommittees who can arrange meetings, take minutes and assist on actioning items needs to be investigated.

With my term coming to an end there will be a call going out for the new Vice President who can support Donette as President. Yes, this role is a daunting task, however it is also an incredible opportunity to contribute to the Architectural profession. Know that if you put your hand up you will be part of an amazing executive team who will support you to reach your goals. Thank you to the membership for entrusting me with the role of PIA President and now the role of SAIA President. I will continue serving this community to the best of my ability.



The Process:

The Process starts with the design of a building system and components. After the design the prototyping of components takes place as this was a first-time project with this system only a few elements were constructed to see if the system components fit and where improvements can be made. Then the Design development follows from prototype build revision of components to improve system and the Detail cutting layouts for components could be done. The next step is the Factory Off-site manufacturing of elements and components. Then the Assembly of elements to make components and the Transport to site. The Build On-site was a rapid process of assembling the building on site.

Small Scale Building:

The notion of small-scale alternative construction comes from seeing the latent talent that is found in our local communities, where people are pivotal to the success. Using this small-scale concept, we developed a system that could be easily constructed and assembled by locals, using basic tools and labour. In this process of collaboration there is a transfer of knowledge and skill which can be honed to create small businesses within the community, creating a building ecosystem where parts can be manufactured off-site and assembly on-site by different people.

From the client:

The architects surprised us with a new and novel idea to approach the construction of our shop. We wanted a solution that allowed for quick assembly to enable us to open as soon as possible.

Urban Design and Urban Activation:

Menlyn Maine Developers required a small urban intervention in a small park space situated between the Main Shopping, west and the Office Block precinct to the east. A small coffee shop space, 60 square meters and some shaded outdoor seating was the requirement. The Structure needed to be semipermanent structure that could be removed if required.

Thinking and Making:

We set out to develop an alternative approach to constructing buildings, a simpler and more efficient way to build. But more so to build at small scale so that anyone can construct their home, shop or building that they need using only a few basic tools and minimal labour.

A complete plywood and steel structural system – designed in detail and modelled 3-dimensionally in the architect's office – then sent to CNC (computer numerical control) Machines for cutting and manufacturing of site in components and then rapidly assembled on site.

Please ensure that you are on our WhatsApp group - it is where our members help one another. If you don't need help, maybe you can help someone else.






